MLIS 7350 Advanced Cataloging and Classification Syllabus - Fall Semester 2003

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Course Description

Prerequisite: MLIS 7300 or consent of instructor. Advanced study of the organization of recordable knowledge, with emphasis on library cataloging and classification. Cataloging of Internet resources, cataloging of continuing resources, and advanced application of Dewey Decimal and Library of Congress classification schemes will be examined.

Course Objectives

At the conclusion of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Catalog Internet resources using MARC21 and AACR2 standards.
- 2. Apply AACR2 standards to the cataloging of continuing resources.
- 3. Classify library materials using Library of Congress or Dewey Decimal classification schemes.
- 4. Identify and use relevant documentation and tools.

Required Tools

Reliable access to the World Wide Web via Internet Explorer 5.x. (Macintosh users, contact the instructor for system requirements.)
