## From your SOLIS President, Layla A. Zeytouni

Serving as VSU's SOLIS President for the 2023-2024 academic year has been an incredibly rewarding experience. Every person who has served on the SOLIS team this year has offered their unique perspectives and skills to help craft events and leadership changes that we hope will benefit the upcoming classes. We enjoyed meeting members of the MLIS community at the fall coffee hours and we're glad that we were able to raise some funds for donation in the annual winter virtual 5K!

One of our most exciting updates is the spring election cycle change. In the past, SOLIS leaders were elected in the fall, causing faculty to need to lead elections as SOLIS members had often graduated. Instead, spring elections offer MLIS students two opportunities: first, to be aware of and prepare for SOLIS events and meetings through the summer. Instead of rushing to plan fall events after elections, concrete plans can be made to ensure that SOLIS has the opportunity to reach as many students as possible. ## **Alumni Spotlight: Vanessa Claros**

Vanessa Claros, earned her Bachelor's of Digital and Broadcast Journalism, cum laude, from the University of Georgia in 2013. She is a 2023 VSU MLIS graduate and a 2023 George Gaumond Award honoree.

She has held positions in various library settings including public, academic, and military. She began her library career in 2013 at Gwinnett County Public Library (GCPL) where she served as a Library Associate at various branches. While at GCPL, she spearheaded diverse programs to serve her community's growing Latinx population. Her interest in serving underserved communities motivated her to begin a series of bilingual adult crafts and a series of bilingual storytimes. During her time at GCPL, Claros wore various hats including being a teen rep and adult programming rep, and was selected to be part of GCPL's Libros En Español committee to help expand GCPL's Spanish collection.



Seeking new opportunities and professional growth, in 2019 she joined Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi's (TAMU-CC) Mary and Jeff Bell Library's Resource Management and Discovery team. In her capacity as a Cataloging Specialist, she gained technical experience and ensured catalog records were accurate and accessible to patrons. While at TAMU-CC, she was selected to serve in the library's social media team, where she contributed weekly content to the Library's social media platforms.

After relocating to North Carolina, Claros joined the Marine Warrior Library in 2022. In her role as Library Tech, Claros began a series of bilingual storytimes and seeing a need, she began a series of conversational sessions for patrons of all ages to practice their English and Spanish.

Aside from her professional work, Claros enjoys volunteering in her community and is an active member in supporting the needs of military members and their families. She currently serves as a volunteer for the United Service Organization (USO) and for Marine Corps Air Station - Cherry Point.

### <u>Alumni Spotlight: Vanessa Claros</u>

#### 1. What were your favorite classes while in the MLIS program?

VSU's MLIS program offers a wealth of insightful courses, and I gained something from every course I completed, but my favorite courses include Management of Libraries and Information Centers and Community Building. Although Management of Libraries and Information Centers was one of the most challenging courses I took during my time in the program, the course developed a curiosity in me to possibly follow a management track in the long-term. The course taught me about effective ways to lead a diverse team and gave me the necessary tools to lead employees of different generations and communication preferences. Another one of my career interests is outreach and marketing, thus, Community Building was a class that I truly enjoyed. It kept me engrossed and reaffirmed my desire to pursue a role as an outreach or engagement librarian.

#### 2. What was your favorite course project while receiving your MLIS degree?

While taking Library Services for Patrons with Disabilities, I developed a community scan of my area and focused on the disability characteristics of my community. The data that I collected offered me insight about what disabilities affect my community and how I can better serve it.

# 3. How has what you learned while getting your MLIS degree directly affected or been applied to your work?

When I signed up for the course Trauma Informed Librarianship, I was working at a military library and taking this course opened my eyes and changed the way I interacted with the military members that I served. Trauma happens to everyone, but military members endure a different kind of trauma that is not experienced by civilians – war. After evaluating the library that I worked for and talking to my colleagues, I realized that it lacked trauma informed support. After taking this course, I am more empathetic, and I reframed my way of thinking. When I encounter a patron that is having a bad day, instead of wondering "What's wrong with them?" I ask myself, "What happened to them?"

# 4. Do you have any advice for upcoming graduates on how to navigate the job search and/or the field as a new graduate?

Advice I'd give to any graduate is use your time in graduate school to also think earnestly about what you like, what give you joy and what setting you want to be in. Although I was qualified to work in many different type libraries, I really liked the impact that libraries have on communities. I also have had a strong appreciation for programs in libraries. I sought a job in a system that prioritizes social impact programming in branches. Don't get frustrated with how long it may take to find your perfect job. It is worth the wait. Professional fulfillment is are worth the wait.
