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An Update from the ACES

It is hard to believe that it is already the end of the school year. But, whether we are prepared or not, this year is coming to a close, and man, has it been a busy one. The Honors Student Association (HSA, or ACES) has set the bar high this year in terms of involvement and productivity. He also presented a slideshow of pictures from Turkey that featured mosques, windows of an ornate nature, and people enjoying their time in the country. The entire presentation was an extraordinary event that helped expose the attendees to a new tradition.

Adebayo, Executive director of the Institute for Global Initiatives at Kennesaw State, gave a thoughtprovoking key note speech entitled "Global Learning: Preparing our Students for a World without Boundaries." Following Dr. Adebayo's talk, students participated in sessions where they reported their personal research on various interesting topics. The presentation sessions were moderated by faculty of the participating schools. Lunch was provided to the participants by Kennesaw State University. Elections of new officers followed lunch. The new President of GCHC is Dr. Jeff Portnoy from Georgia Perimeter College and our Honors Director, Dr. Nikolova, was elected Faculty Vice-President of the organization. Once the business meeting adjourned, students and directors were invited to take part in a roundtable / business meeting. What could be done to improve Honors programs in general, this specific conference, and many other things were discussed. One more afternoon session of presentations of students' work marked the finale of the conference. Hugh C. Bailey Scholarship

This endowed scholarship was created by Dr. Hugh C. Bailey, President of Valdosta State University from 1978 to 2001, to support academic excellence and achievement in every academic discipline through participation in the University Honors Program. It was first awarded in 2006. There are, of course certain criteria in order for a student to be eligible for this scholarship. The student must be a full-time student admitted into the Honors program who has completed from 45 to 75 hours, 10 of which must be Honors classes. Also, the students must have a cumulative GPA of 3.6. Finally, the student must "exemplify the spirit of inquiry and service that characterizes the Honors Program." The winners of this award for 2008 are Ashlie Braswell, Kristin Morrison, Jay Prosser, and Danielle Sheffield.

Ashlie Braswell is a sophomore nursing major who has recently been accepted into the School of Nursing at Valdosta State University. After receiving her undergraduate degree, she plans to attend medical school to receive an M.D. She plans on having a career in pediatric medicine.

Kristin Morrison is a sophomore psychology major with a minor in mathematics. She plans on attending graduate school to get her PhD. She is considering going into a field with quantitative psychology / psychometrics which focuses on the quantitative, research oriented commonalities relevant to most of the behavioral sciences and their applications in industry, education, and the health sciences.

Hugh C. Bailey Scholarship Continued

Jay Prosser is a junior with a dual History and French major and a minor in international studies. He plans on going for his PhD after he receives his undergraduate degree. He plans on teaching History at the university level some day. Along with being published in the field of history, he also aspires to be published in the field fiction.

Danielle Sheffield is a junior with a major in Communication Disoders. After completing her undergraduate degree in May 2009, she plans on attending graduate school and receiving a doctorate dregree (AuD). She aspires to have a career in the field of audiology.

Bartram Award

The Bartram Award is named for famed explorer and naturalist William Bartram and recognized exceptional achievement. It is awarded each spring to a University Honors Program student who had demonstrated the skills of intellectual exploration, adventure, and achievement. Any student who wants to be considered for this award must be a sophomore or junior with a GPA 3.3 or higher who is currently enrolled in Honors classed or else has completed all Honors program requirements. This student must also demonstrate exceptional research, scholarly or creative activity in a course of study. The winner of this award for 2008 was W. Jake Newsome.



His paper for the Bartram Award was 28 pages long and is titled: "Living the Good Life: Serious Games and their Impact on Mayan Identity". The paper is the culmination of research, which included: preliminary research, one month in Blue Creek Village, Belize (during Summer 07), and subsequent research once he returned. It is considered an ethnography, which is an anthropological type of paper consisting of observations (interviews, etc) and interpretation of the data using social theories. His paper specifically, dealt with Mayan identity in today's world. To help understand Mayan identity, he observed the Maya's view of the "Good Life," and how they strove to achieve this good life through what are known as "Serious Games" which refers to the "games" of life in which each human being is active player: survival, work, education, the pursuit of happiness. Their goal, their prize is the Good Life. So by watching what kind of games they played, one can see what the Maya valued and what motivated them; this is a deep insight into identity. His results found that there is an identity crisis (though they never used that term) among the different generations of Maya. The older generation was afraid that the Mayan identity was going to die out after they were gone. But, his research found that the Mayan identity was not dying out; it is just changing and adapting. In other words, the rules to the games were changing, and the players had to change their own games in order to reach their Good Life. So, the younger generation is actively creating a new Mayan identity that is adapted to a changing world.

That paper also won First Prize for the annual Georgia Consortium for International Studies Student Prize for Excellence in International Studies. "The GCIS is a collaborative partnership of seventeen Georgia institutions of higher education aimed at promoting intercultural understanding." It is actually a faculty Consortium and only three students from across the state are recognized each year: 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place prizes. This was the first time ever that someone from VSU won the award.

Jake is a history major with minors in International Studies, and German. He also plans on going to grad school where he plans on earning his Master's and Doctoral degrees. Ultimately, he wants to become a college professor and teach American & German history.

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Dr. Matthew Richard: The Winner of the Exemplary Honors Professor of the Year

Dr. Matthew Richards is a New Englander and has been "curious since childhood and has spent a lifetime trying to formulate questions" that hold a certain significance to his own life. This, he says, "is harder than it sounds as we humans are so mystified by 'structures' that we often don't know where to begin." He studied zoologyin college and then served as a Peace Corps volunteer in West Africa.

He has won this award 3 times. He says "It's a nice feeling. I try to deliver meaningful information in my classes and I guess the award means that students feel that the course was indeed useful. The amazing thing about anthropology is that it works on many levels; one gains insight into the workings of the world and into the workings of the self. The impact of all this insight is truly profound.

Dr. Richard believes that Honors students are "fighters f or clarity; they're not satisfied with 'pat answers' or 'canned information.' They aren't angry or scared of ideas that complicate their understanding of existence... They are great thinkers with boundless imaginations and tremendous work ethics..."

He feels that his students are also ambitious and they hate mediocrity. "They recognize quality efforts and take a mature approach to learning." He also says that he and his students laugh a lot. "Wit is a surefire sign of intelligence!"
