9th Annual Dr. George R. Deavour's Memorial Lecture Series



Valdosta State University held the 9th Annual Dr. George R. Deavours Memorial Lecture series on September 22nd 2023 honoring Dr. George R. Deavours. His vision of a certified master's degree program was realized in 1993 when the Communication Disorders Program was accredited by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association. With the help of a Board of Regent's grant, the master's program became the largest CD program in the state and region, graduating 75-100 new SLPs a year to meet the growing need for therapists. In 1999, he and the 17-member faculty he had assembled moved the program to the new Special Education and Communication Disorders Building. During the next few years, he watched the program he founded and built serve children and adults with communication disorders in a modern building, as well as in many offcampus community sites. The faculty he assembled was large, diverse, and productive. Having accomplished all, he had hoped to achieve, Dr. Deavours retired as a full professor in 2002. Dr. Deavours has a remarkable history of excellent teaching, important research, and the capacity to surround himself with dedicated professionals who loved working for their friend. He has touched the lives of many.

PRESENTER

The presentation, "A Person-Centered Approach to Aphasia Management", given by Dr. Jacqueline Hinckley Ph.D CCC- SLP, provided insightful information leaving participants with the ability to define patient-centered care, learn how to create functional person-centered goals, and administer functional assessments for aphasia based on evidence-based practice.

<u>Upcoming 10th Annual Dr. Robert A. Hull Jr.'s Memorial</u> <u>Lecture Series</u>



Dr. Robert A. Hull, Jr.'s foresight in academia led him to develop and teach undergraduate and graduate courses at Ball State University and Valdosta State University. In addition to his role as a beloved professor and advisor, Bob was a clinical supervisor, a clinic director, an off campus placement coordinator, and the parliamentarian and executive secretary of the university faculty senate.

His impact on the SLP profession spanned the country through his service to multiple state and national professional organizations, including being a member of GSHA for 23 years. Over time, he held every office in the association, including President for two terms. He also served on several ASHA committees and was the Publications and Technology Chair for the Council of State Association Presidents, an affiliation of ASHA. At the 2009 GSHA annual convention, he was awarded the Honors of the Association in recognition of his outstanding performance in clinical service, academic teaching, service to GSHA, and service to other local, regional, and national organizations.

Dr. Hull will always be remembered for his love for family, VSU, and his students. All proceeds from the Hull Memorial Lecture Series benefit the Dr. Robert A. Hull Scholarship Fund.

Students Volunteer at The Canopy

Every semester, the students in Dr. Hannibal's Aphasia class complete a Gerontology interaction project at The Canopy at Azalea Grove, where they further their knowledge in geriatrics. The students visit the residents once a week and participate in a wide range of activities from playing trivia to puzzles. During this experience, students develop meaningful friendships with the residents while also completing memory and problem-solving tasks. Students collaborate with an on-site speech language pathologist where they can interact and participate in activities with memory care residents. Literacy Screenings and Diagnostics

The Scottish-Rite Literacy Program was established in 2019 and has grown each year since. All services are completely free of charge and sponsored by the Scottish-Rite Valley of Southwest Georgia. Mrs. Taylor Grantham provides all clinical supervision for the program. In the 2023-2024 school year, we have:

- provided over 30 dyslexia evaluations
- provided evidence-based literacy intervention to 20 students
- assisted the Masonic Home for Children with the literacy assessment of 14 of their wards
- signed up 20 kids for our summer literacy clinic.

As a teaching clinic, we also focus on the impact for our VSU students. From this perspective, graduate students of speech-language pathology have obtained the following number of supervised hours during the 2023-2024 school year:

- 85 literacy evaluation hours
- 150 literacy treatment hours





The Scottish-Rite Literacy Program was also successful in obtaining \$50,000 in funding from the Sandra Dunagan Deal Center for Early Language and Literacy in order to provide a free summer literacy camp to 32 rising first grade students from the Valdosta City School district. These children will be provided with transportation and nutrition at a local elementary school two times per week, where they will receive direct instruction in their school's reading curriculum by graduate students of speech-language pathology. Eight graduate students at VSU will be selected to complete extensive professional development in the Reading Horizons Literacy Curriculum as part of the grant efforts. This represents a unique service and experiential-based learning opportunity for the VSU graduate students to not only receive additional training in a highly relevant and impactful program, but also to apply their training in a real-world educational environment.


New Department Head


Graduate School Symposium
